## Ohio Society Winter Meeting in Dayton, OH

The 2020 Winter Meetings of the Ohio SAR took place in Dayton on Friday and Saturday, February 7-8, 2019. The Hope Hotel and Richard C. Hollbrook Conference Center at Wright Patterson AFB was the site of this year's meeting.

The Executive Meeting was convened at 7:30 pm. All five Executive Committee Members were present.

The Executive Committee reviewed the completion status of committee and officer reports and the agenda items that would be brought before the Board of Management on Saturday. 1st Vice President Lee Wilkerson III provided an overview of his proposed budget for 2020-2021. A motion was passed approving the expenditures for the Dayton 6 Award Luncheon as they were not covered in the budget.

The BOM Meeting convened on Saturday morning with 24 Compatriots representing 14 Chapters. First on the agenda

were reports from Officers, District and Committee Chairmen.

Don McGraw presented the Nominating Committee Report for 2020-2021 slate of officers. All openings have been filled. The list of nominees is below.

Lee Wilkerson presented the proposed budget for 2020-2021 and it was approved.

Lee Wilkerson presented the status of the Black Powder Insurance Committee. Board of Management passed a motion for the Executive Committee to proceed with making a decision on purchase of the new policy.

Jack Bredenfoerder presented a resolution submitted by the Finance Committee regarding changes to payout of funds from the Ohio Life Fund. The resolution passed and authorizes payouts to each the State Society and the Chapters at \$8 per Life Member.

Three ad hoc committees were established. A Records Storage Committee was established to evaluate methods for electronically storing documents. A Regula-

tions Review Committee to evaluate changes in the Regulations and Manual was established. A Committee to look into how to better locate families of deceased compatriots was formed.

### “Dayton 6” Award Luncheon

At the Winter Board of Management Meeting a resolution was passed to honor six officers of the Dayton, Ohio police force with each receiving the NSSAR Heroism Medal.

On the night of August 4th, 2019 a gunman opened fire on citizens in a popular district in Dayton. Nine citizens were killed before Sergeant William Knight, Officer Jeremy Campbell, Officer Vincent Carter, Officer David Denlinger, Officer Ryan Nabel and Officer Brian Rolfes could stop the gunman.

Jim Schaffers words in the invitation to attend the luncheon bare witness to our feelings: “The heroic actions are exemplary, and have earned them the respect of our communities and the members of the Ohio Society Sons of the American Revolution.”

The medals were presented at an award luncheon at the Hope Hotel following the Winter Board of Management Meeting. Ohio Attorney General David Yost provided the keynote address.

### National Society Spring Leadership Conference

The National Society held its 2020 Spring Leadership Conference at the Brown Hotel in Louisville, Kentucky on February 24th & 25th 2020. National Society committees met throughout Friday and the Trustees meeting was held on Saturday morning.

The Ohio Society Compatriots in attendance were National Trustee and Past President Shawn Cox; Ohio Genealogist and past Central District VPG Timothy E. Ward; Ohio President Steve Hinson; Ohio Treasurer John H. Bredenfoerder; Ohio 2nd VP & Registrar Troy Bailey; Ohio Southwest District Chairman Elwin Spray; Ohio Color Guard Commander Steven Frash; and Past Cincinnati President Michael Gunn.

The Color Guard announced the Insurance Committee was evaluating an umbrella liability insurance covering general liability and black powder firing for National, State Societies and Chapters.

The Trustees approved an increase in application fees to \$100, supplemental to \$100 and family to \$40 clearing the way for a vote by membership in July at Congress.

Tradition towards history has always had a way of insinuating itself regarding recorded events to the point that events of equal importance often are plunged into near obscurity.

Such is the case regarding the Camp Charlotte affair. It stands in the annals of our American history as a forgotten chapter & its contributions to our American independence questioned.

Camp Charlotte was a military encampment set up by Lord Dunmore and his Virginia troops in mid October 1774 to consummate a treaty with Shawnee Indian tribes following the Battle at Point Pleasant. Camp Charlotte was located south of current Circleville Ohio.

Ironically, both scholars and historians unanimously agree that the Camp Charlotte affair settled an issue and addressed a serious threat on the western border of the colonies. If this threat had not been settled, it assuredly would have jeopardized the long road to Yorktown and subsequently influenced the quest towards American independence. The colonies could ill afford a two front war, particularly one at its back door.

As a local Pickaway county historian and the current President of the Camp Charlotte Chapter my quest began with an exhaustive & detailed study regarding the Camp Charlotte affair. The research project has extended over ten years and massive amount of documentation regarding the events of the fall of 1774 has been engineered. These efforts have yielded the actual original copy of the Camp Charlotte Treaty along with numerous other documents pertaining to the treaty and event.

In October 2019 a special historical exhibit was organized at the Pickaway County Historical and Genealogical Library to display many of the documents, to celebrate 245<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Camp Charlotte affair and to help educate the academic community. Several SAR and DAR chapters attended the exhibit. On October 12th a Memorial Ceremony was held at the Logan Elm State park in Pickway County with over 60 in attendance.

The quest involved researching land records & utilizing a drone to photograph the topography of the terrain to point out the precise location of Camp Charlotte. Current work with Dr. Jarrod Burks, Director of Archaeological Geophysics who is conducting magnetic survey of the spot is in progress. This should provide conclusive proof of the camps precise location.

The possibility that the actions which had transpired on the Pickaway Plains in the fall of 1774, could be considered as among the first steps taken towards gaining our American Independence is being explored. It would be the natural conclusion given the fact that both the SAR & DAR both

recognize the Battle of Point Pleasant as the First battle of the American Revolution and Camp Charlotte was the aftermath. Furthermore, this event occurred six months before Lexington and Concord.

Readers should understand the following facts regarding Camp Charlotte and its legacy.

Immediately after the Battle of Point Pleasant, there were no reports filed and no published accounts with the exception of a meager account in the Virginia Gazette, a small newspaper of meager circulation.

Events from the subsequent revolutionary war came so fast as to preclude any efforts to weigh the accomplishments of Point Pleasant.

It would not be until 1787 upon the adoption of the United States constitution and the acquisition of the Northwest Territory would the importance of Point Pleasant and Camp Charlotte become clear.

The outcome of the Camp Charlotte Treaty represents an important & significant accomplishment in this nation's transformation from thirteen individual colonies into one of the world's most powerful nations representing life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

The treaty itself is not the Declaration of Independence, nor the Constitution of the United States, nor the Bill of Rights, but its success made possible the creation of these three cherished documents.

With the exception of its obvious accomplishment of eliminating the threat & securing the western frontier, the Camp Charlotte Treaty also holds the distinction as the farthest reaching in results from any other battle ever fought on the American continent.

The treaty was accomplished without any financial burdens or without price, with the exception of the blood of the courageous men who gave the ultimate sacrifice for the cause of liberty.

Lastly, it's the only occasion in the entire history of the American Revolution, where this number of historical & influential fig-

ures of that era, were ever assembled in one location at the same time.

Six would later occupy seats in the House of Representatives, three would become members of the United States Senate, four would become future Governors, one would become a future territorial governor, one would become the military and civil commandant of upper Louisiana, seven of the officer's present went on to reach the rank & serve as generals during the American Revolution and serve with distinction. Six captains would ultimately command regiments during the Revolution, & four of those officers would ultimately lead an attack at Gwynn's Island in 1776 dislodging Lord John Murray Dunmore & force him away forever from the shores of the United States of America.

The goal is essentially to bring about deeper understanding of this event. Armed with the undeniable truths, we can formulate educated opinions. We should never forget these events for their significance

We owe a debt of gratitude to our pioneers. We stand as the guardians of our past and the stewards for our future. By preserving our past, we can enrich the present and inspire hope for the future..

## The Camp Charlotte Legacy

Chief Logan of the Mingo tribe delivered an impassioned speech called Logan's Lament beneath an Elm tree near Camp Charlotte. The Lament was recorded by a Colonel John Gibson from Dunmore's camp. Almost 200 years later in 1964 the remains of the dead elm tree were taken down and pieces turned into commemorative relics. In

April of 1964 the Ohio History Society presented the Ohio Society SAR with a gavel made from the Logan Elm. The gavel is passed on each year to the new president. The legacy of the last true witness to the events of the fall of 1774 remains preserved. The great elm continues to bear witness to current events. It presides along with each Ohio Society President.

## Our Nations 250th Anniversary



Sons of the American Revolution remember the 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Boston Massacre

In 2026, our nation will be celebrating its 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Many events led up to the 1776 declaration. One of the most significant was an event which came to be known as the Boston Massacre, which took place 250 years ago on March 5<sup>th</sup> 1770, on King Street in Boston, Massachusetts.

This day is remembered as the day resident British soldiers opened fire on a crowd of unarmed Colonists. Frightened by the taunts and threats of the civilians, many carrying stout firewood clubs, the soldiers' discipline failed, and they opened fire at

point blank range.

Boston political leaders labeled the incident a massacre and demanded the soldiers, including Capt. Thomas Preston, be tried for murder. The resulting trial, at which John Adams defended Preston, freed the soldiers, but British troops were withdrawn to Castle William in Boston Harbor.

There was no further violence but the Boston Massacre produced colonial martyrs, and provided a rallying point for anti-British sentiments. According to published reports of the day, "There were then killed and wounded by a discharge of musketry, eleven of his Majesty's subjects..."

So "Let us remember our obligations to our forefathers, who gave us our Constitution, the Bill of Right, and Independent Supreme Court and a nation of free men."
